



















# **OUR ROYAL HERITAGE BOSWA BA SEGOSI SA RONA**

Lebone II College has a proud African heritage. The history of the Royal Bafokeng Nation can be traced back to 1140, and is characterised by a spirit of independence, adaptability and foresight.

Under the insightful leadership of Kgosi Mokgatle, who reigned from 1834 to 1891, the men of the Bafokeng left Phokeng to raise money by working on the diamond mines in Kimberley. As black South Africans could not own property at that time, the Bafokeng Nation pooled its money and bought land with the help of Lutheran missionaries, who fronted the purchases and then held it in trust for the community.



Welcome to Lebone II - College of the Royal Bafokeng!

My brother, Kgosi Lebone II, and I shared a passion for the idea of bringing world-class educational facilities to Phokeng, and building a school that would offer the best academic opportunities in the midst of natural African splendour, and a warm and welcoming atmosphere.

My brother's vision resulted in the founding of Lebone II, one of his proudest legacies, and I have the honour of expanding on his work by bringing the best teachers, facilities, and learners together in this unique and special environment.

In the 1920s, platinum deposits were discovered on Bafokeng land, which led to a wave of encroachment over the years by mining companies. With the arrival of democracy in 1994, the Bafokeng, under Kgosi Edward Lebone Molotlegi (Lebone I), were for the first time able to legally control their own territory, negotiate a mutually beneficial agreement with mining companies, and gain a stake in the mines and earning rights from their land's use.

Visionary leadership has led to the Bafokeng Nation's prosperity - a tradition that is carried through to its investment in civil and infrastructure programmes to uplift its community.

Lebone II – College of the Royal Bafokeng was established in 1998 as the vision of Koosi Lebone II (1995-2000), who founded a world-class education facility in Phokeng. This vision has been further supported and nurtured by Kgosi Leruo Tshekedi Molotlegi (2000-present), Under Kaosi Leruo, the school moved to its new world-class campus in 2012, and he remains unwavering in his support of the school and the development of excellent educational opportunities and facilities for the Nation

# THE UPPER SCHOOL SEKOLO SE SE GOLWANE

#### A CURRICULUM FOR GREATNESS I THUTO YA MAEMO A KWA GODIMO

The Lebone II Upper School, Grades 8 to 12, follows the Independent Examination Board (IEB) programme. Our curriculum is flexible and consists of best practice national and international models, and allows for innovation and creativity from both teachers and students. We create a rich and fulfilling learning environment that promotes learning-how-to-learn, and we equip our students with the skills required to be their own managers, marketers and global communicators. Lebone prepares our students to succeed in an ever-changing world.

#### GRADES 8 to 9 | MOPHATO 8-9

Students in Grades 8 to 9 explore a range of academic and extracurricular activities so that they can make informed decisions regarding their subject selection for Grades 10 to 12. Using this multi-disciplinary approach the focus is on getting students to fall in love with the enterprise of education, and to love learning. This phase has a strong emphasis on skills development, and by the end of this stage, students know how to speak and write clearly, think deeply and be tech-savvy, before transitioning to the FET phase. During Grade 8 and 9 a comprehensive guidance programme is in place to help each student choose their subjects for the FET phase.

Grades 8 to 9 subjects that are compulsory for all students:

- English (medium of instruction)
- Setswana or Afrikaans
- Mathematics
- Natural Science

- Global Studies Life Orientation
- Design and Technology

#### The students are also exposed to the following courses each term:

- Music
- Economic Management Sciences
- Information Technology
- Engineering Graphics and Design

#### GRADES 10 to 12 | MOPHATO 10-12

In the FET phase our students focus on their core subject choices, whilst enjoying rich participation in many co-curricular offerings in the sciences, arts, humanities and internal relations, including academic outings and subject-specific camps. In Grade 10 our students enjoy the opportunity to participate in a number of global exchange opportunities as part of the academic year.

In Grade 12 our students focus on their preparation for the IEB examinations. Our Grade 12 classes generally achieve a 100% pass rate in the final examinations, with the majority securing bachelor's degree passes. Our students widely achieve subject distinctions and score top marks in Mathematics Olympiads and Science expositions.

#### GEAR (GROW, EXPLORE, ACHIEVE, RESPOND) I (KGOTO, TLHOTLHOMISA, FITLHELELE, TSIBOGA)

All Upper School students participate in extracurricular GEAR (Grow, Explore, Achieve, Respond) subjects for three afternoons each week. Students register for their choice of exciting GEAR subjects each term, which cater to various academic, arts, culture, community and sport interests.

#### **GRADE CAMPS | DIKAMPA TSA MEPHATO**

At the start of each academic year all Upper School students attend grade camps, which vary in length and activities according to grades. These fun camps serve to develop an identity and camaraderie in each grade, and enhance leadership skills amongst the students. Focus at the camps is also placed on enhancing a positive school community and school culture, where students understand both their freedom and their responsibilities



#### DYNAMIC LEARNING I THUTO E MATLHAGATLHAGA

The curriculum for students in Grade R to 7 covers Mathematics, English, Setswana, Afrikaans, Science, Social Sciences, Music, Art, Drama, Physical Education, and includes organised and individual sport, cultural activities, and individual musical instrument lessons. Our teachers structure a dynamic learning environment that nurtures curiosity and develops inquiring minds and research skills.

The Lower School teaching and learning curriculum is a blend of both CAPS and IEB, using best international practice. This means that during the process of learning students acquire and apply critical thinking, research, self-management, social and communication skills.

#### GRADES R to 31 MOPHATO R-3

In Grades R to 3, students receive intentional teaching in English. Setswana. Mathematics. Afrikaans and Life Skills by using the inquiry approach, which incorporates organised learning activities and learning through play. The Grade 3 students, whilst characterised as part of the Foundation Phase, follow the same learning structure as the Intermediate Phase below.

### MOPHATO 4-7

Each year our Grade 5 classes take an exciting trip to GRADES 4 to 7 | KAROLO YA BOGARENG-Mpumalanga for a week of wonderful exploration of the Lowveld which includes visits to Sabie, Pilgrims Rest, the Sudwala Caves and God's Window, and In Grades 4 to 7 the units of inquiry - traditionally incorporates a fantastic combination of time spent known as subjects – are packaged into sections with friends, meeting raptors, waterfalls, swimming throughout the year. Grades 4 to 7 students are benchmarked on the International Benchmark Tests from Australia.

Lower School students do not write exams but are continually assessed throughout the year. Parents receive detailed reports four times a year, giving them an in-depth assessment of areas of strength and areas that the student struggles with. Children are measured against their own performance and development.

### OUTINGS | MAETO

Each grade is given the opportunity to go on outings which form part of an extension as to what is being taught in the classroom. These outings enhance the learning process and are thoroughly enjoyed by students.

In Grade 4 the students enjoy a three day Spirit of Adventure camp. This is a fun and interactive time which they share with their friends, and where they conquer their fears as they participate in hikes, climbing, abseiling, and watersports.

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

The programme allows students to immerse themselves in other cultures; in some instances, they live with host families and participate in cultural festivals.





The Lebone II Summer Programme is an eight-week programme which is run in partnership with Harvard's Centre for African Studies. This programme provides Harvard University undergraduates the opportunity to live and work at Lebone II College, where they take on a variety of roles including academic tutoring and mentorship across a wide range of subject areas. During their time at Lebone they assist with the Lebone II Leadership Festival, participate in community projects, prepare and administer practices of SAT writing, work with students in boarding, and are involved in school programmes in the Lower and Upper Schools. This programme has a wonderful impact on our own students who are tutored and mentored by these undergraduates.

#### THE LEBONE II LEADERSHIP FESTIVAL I MOLETLO WA BOETELEDIPELE WA LEBONE II

Students and staff from a wide range of schools in South Africa, and across the world participate in a rich week of dialogue, sharing, personal growth and problem-solving at the week-long Lebone II Leadership Festival in July each year. These young leaders tackle a variety of global and community topical issues, and grow from the opportunity to exchange ideas, debate, negotiate and bridge differences. This annual collaboration and teambuilding between leading schools across the world is inspirational for all involved.







### **OUR SPORTS PROGRAMME** LENANEO LA RONA LA METSHAMEKO

At Lebone II we encourage our students to embrace a well-rounded life by providing them with the time and support to pursue sporting activities. Our spacious campus and impressive natural surroundings allow us to host a number of prestigious sporting events. Students are encouraged to pursue a variety of sporting interests. This provides the opportunity to teach valuable lessons about teamwork and to develop a healthy attitude towards competition.

Sporting and cultural activities available to Lebone students include athletics, swimming, netball, soccer, rugby, cricket, hockey, volleyball, basketball, tennis, cross-country, ballet, hip-hop dance and chess. As part of the local clubs in and around our community that our students have access to. some also participate and excel in activities such as judo, TSKKIA karate, horse riding, and acro and hip-hop dancing.

The school's culture of excellence is applied to our sporting programmes through the excellent training provided by our teaching team, who remain active. involved and engaged in their respective sporting strengths.

Our annual Mathaithai Trail Run & MTB Race is a popular sports event on our calendar and attracts thousands of participants to Lebone II College. Now in its eighth year the challenge includes trail runs of 20km, 10km, 5km and a 2km fun run, and the Mountain Bike race gives cyclists the choice of three distances: 45km. 15km and 5km. on trails and tracks through the impressive bushveld adjacent to the school. The Mathaithai event is a festival weekend at Lebone II, which offers something for both experienced and novice athletes, and is a fun time out for the whole family.




#### BOARDING FACILITIES | DIDIRISWA TSA BONNO BOROBALO

Our rooms accommodate between two and eight students, while matric boarders have a single room to allow for a quiet study space. Communal spaces are well integrated throughout the boarding houses, with small courtyards, a kitchen, dining rooms, lounges and pool tables in each boarding house.

Students are served nutritious meals and school-







time snacks in the dining hall of the school each day. From the boarding houses students have access to a number of the school's facilities including the library, IT laboratory and sports fields.

#### THE TEACHING AND LEARNING CENTRE I LEFAPHA LA GO RUTA LE GO ITHUTA GA BARUTWANA

The Teaching and Learning Centre (TLC) provides psychological and learning support services to students, teachers, parents and members of the broader Phokeng community. The centre is staffed by two full-time remedial therapists, a full-time occupational therapist, two full-time psychologists and a full-time counsellor, meaning it is able to provide remedial therapy, language therapy, occupational therapy, psychotherapy and psychological assessments.

TLC services are geared towards helping students who are struggling, either with their schoolwork or with challenges outside the school environment that have an effect on their schooling. The TLC also deals with disciplinary issues because often where there's a disciplinary matter, there's an emotional aspect that needs to be addressed as well.

Another aspect of holistic childcare at Lebone II College is pastoral care. Such care is broad, and includes well-adjusted children who also need

Lebone II College has a fully equipped clinic, with a staff complement of two gualified nurses and an assistant. The clinic sees to the well-being of all our students as well as our staff members. A doctor visits the school twice weekly, and a physiotherapist and a dentist on a weekly basis.

The centre, which ensures patient confidentiality, manages everything from treating minor ailments to stabilising a life-threatening situation while getting patients ready for transport to the nearest hospital. It is also fully equipped with a dispensary of over-the-counter medication. The centre conducts screening campaigns throughout the school, and offers flu vaccinations, eye screenings and deworming campaigns. Students receive comprehensive care at no cost.

At Lebone II we are redefining excellence in education and continually challenging ourselves to redefine, rethink and reinvent. At Lebone our teachers


participate in development opportunities locally and globally. These opportunities for training and exposure contributes to their ability to deliver exceptional teaching experiences in their classrooms.

#### AN INSPIRING CAMPUS | LEFELO LA BOITHUTO LE LE NONOFATSANG

Lebone II College was built to resemble a village, with the design intended to represent the settlement pattern of the traditional ordering of the villages of the Bafokeng years ago. Classes are set up as neighbourhoods, and the spaces in-between are communal and social. Ample use of glass maximises natural light in the buildings, particularly in the classrooms. The L-shaped classrooms, each with a sliding door that leads on to a courtyard with a tree in the middle, allow for a free flow of fresh, cool air from outside, and are vibrant, creative learning spaces.

The Amphitheatre, the pulse of our campus, is the school's main gathering space. The centre stage, surrounded by ascending grass-covered seating and steps resembling the slopes of a mountain, is the ideal space to meet and celebrate. A steel canopy, with positive and negative spaces, covers the amphitheatre and creates patterned shade on a sunny day, which reminds us of our community where meetings often take place beneath shady trees.

The art studio and the drama theatre, popularly known as the **Black Box**, are the creative hubs at Lebone II. The black carpet covering the sprung and cushioned floor of the drama theatre is perfect for dance and



drama classes. The box has movable seating, making it a dynamic space for performances and theatre workshops.

The **library** is a space where our students take what they've learnt in the classrooms further, by accessing additional study material and conducting research. Students in the Lower School enjoy reading hour, literacy promotions, arts and crafts, as well as other activities in the library. Our library not only tells the rich history of the Royal Bafokeng Nation through books on its shelves – the building itself, thanks to the mosaic art on the walls, is an informative and colourful history lesson on the establishment of the Royal Bafokeng Nation. The junior section of the library is furnished with cosy floor cushions and waist-high bookshelves for the little ones, while a double-volume courtyard in the seniors' section is furnished with giant outdoor chess pieces.

#### SUSTAINABILITY AT LEBONE | KGATISO-TSWELETSO MO LEBONE

The sustainability of the buildings as well as their environmental implications were of great significance in the design and construction of the Lebone II College, such that the school subsequently earned both the Loerie Award for 3 Dimensional Design and the SAPOA Award for Innovation Excellence in Property.

From our grounds to the way we preserve and recycle water and energy, our physical infrastructure ensures that we leave a positive carbon footprint. Our lush landscape – a mixture of wild bush and pristine lawn – is irrigated by rainwater harvested to the ponds and dams on and around the campus. We don't irrigate with municipal water.

Sustainability and education are joined at the hip as they are both concerned with the future and future generations. For teaching to have lasting value it needs to embody sustainability. The school has a gardening club, which among other activities, has planted a green garden which will in time be viewable on Google Earth. We also have our own herb, kitchen and butterfly gardens. A number of sustainability and recycling initiatives are in place. The 'Paper4Bread' campaign, started by a student, ensures that all paper is recycled and the money raised is used to buy food for an outreach programme. All plastic bottles and tetrapaks are also recycled, with plastics going to the Owl Rescue Centre in Hartbeespoort. Bottle tops and bread tags are collected to be exchanged for a wheelchair, the second wheelchair to be handed to a member of our community. Amongst others, these initiatives form part of the school's plan to drastically reduce our waste going to landfills.











# **OUR COMMUNITY MORAFE WA RONA**

In addition to striving for academic excellence and driving innovation, another of Lebone II College's core mandates is to drive the development of our community – a focus that is just as strong as achieving academic excellence.

We have a proud tradition of community participation, and community impact is woven into all aspects of our schooling. Everyone, including students and staff. takes part. We speak about service, relevance and impact, and at Lebone, we want our students to know that as leaders they cannot not serve. Leaders need to be open, they need to be able to walk the talk, they need to be humble and they need to be able to roll up their sleeves.

As such many of the initiatives we're involved in are proposed and driven by our students. They come up with ideas on which community development initiatives the school can embark on. They conduct a needs analysis to identify what the community's needs are and, if their proposals are approved, they run with the projects.

#### PART OF OUR COMMUNITY | RE MALOKO A MORAFE WA RONA

Lebone II students aim to impact our world through meaningful, kind and innovative actions. We call this "shining our light." Some of their initiatives have included the collection of water for the residents of Cape Town, who were facing a water crisis as a result of ongoing drought in the Cape provinces, and the



















collection of clothing, household goods, canned foods and toys for Hospice. Our Lebone students, staff, families and school community made 'snugglers'; water-proof sleeping bags from recycled newspaper and plastics, which were then given to people living on the streets of our community. Lebone also adopted two cheetahs at the Ann van Dyk Cheetah Centre in De Wildt, and money raised went towards their care for a year, including food, yet visits and improvements to their homes.

Throughout the year our students, staff and families are involved in numerous outreach activities. They have collected toiletries for the residents of a local Old Aged Home, and donated dog food, cat food, blankets and newspapers for the SPCA. They have also collected blankets and socks in a winter drive for those broader community. Kabelano means "to share" in need, and collected shoes and sports equipment for and the programme is a wonderful way to share our a nearby farm school. At the end of the year Lebone students and their families pack Christmas boxes for children from local orphanages and donate their stationery to local schools. Many of our teachers and staff are also involved in community initiatives and volunteer their time to give extra classes at local schools.

#### COMMUNITY PROGRAMMES | MANANEO/ DITHULAGANYO TSA MORAFE

One of our major community programmes is our collaboration with local schools, whom we partner with in academic, sporting, cultural and teacherdevelopment initiatives. Many of these schools lack resources such as computer and science laboratories, so they use our facilities to do practical work.

Through our library outreach initiative with local pre-schools we transport pre-scholars to our library on a bi-weekly basis, where we avail resources and books to them and assist them with their academic development. Our students read to the little ones. and assist them with their homework. Currently this programme reaches 120 pre-scholars.

Lebone Kabelano is our community education outreach programme, through which we host guest speakers each month, who present on topics which are relevant to children, parents and teachers of our resources to the benefit of others.



### **OUR ALUMNI BAITHUTI BA MALOBA**

Lebone II acknowledges its alumni as its testimony and legacy. We seek to foster strong relationships with venture into society to 'shine their light.' They are our alumni to celebrate their success and to support others where possible.

Lebone took in its first students in 1997. The first group of matriculants, just 12 students in total, completed Grade 12 in 2003. By 2016 a total of 73 students wrote Grade 12 exams. In this time, the school has grown in number, relocated from a previous the school and to our community. We look forward, campus in the heart of Phokeng to Tshufi Hill and changed remarkably. We organise regular Provincial Chapter Meetings and keep our doors open to alumni to visit the campus. Alumni are usually invited and always welcome to join our major events at school. We encourage alumni to become involved in activities, which benefit the community at large, and in which the school can partner with them.
